Procedure to View Russell's Answers

Overview: The book that Chrissy gave her father for Christmas 2009 to record some of his life memories (*To Our Children's Children - Journal of Family Memories*) actually consists of 234 individual pages, each page typically with several questions.

The answers to the questions are being placed in WORD documents (as of 12/2013, as an on-going project, questions on about 40 pages have at least been started), usually one WORD document for each *To Our Children's Children* question page.

All these resulting WORD documents have been loaded into CyBeRev, but not (yet) directly into CheneyJournal.Com.

However, virtually all of the contents of CyBeRev are viewable; no special IDs or passwords are required.

The following is a procedure to view Russell's answers (so far) to Chrissy's book's questions!

By the way, CyBeRev contains more than just these WORD documents; it contains additional WORD documents, plus images, audio recording (of Con and Russ singing to Russ's guitar), and is expected in the future to contain many other items feel free to explore and enjoy!

Hopefully coming soon: a Subject Index which will help you find the pages that contain reference to your specific areas of interest.

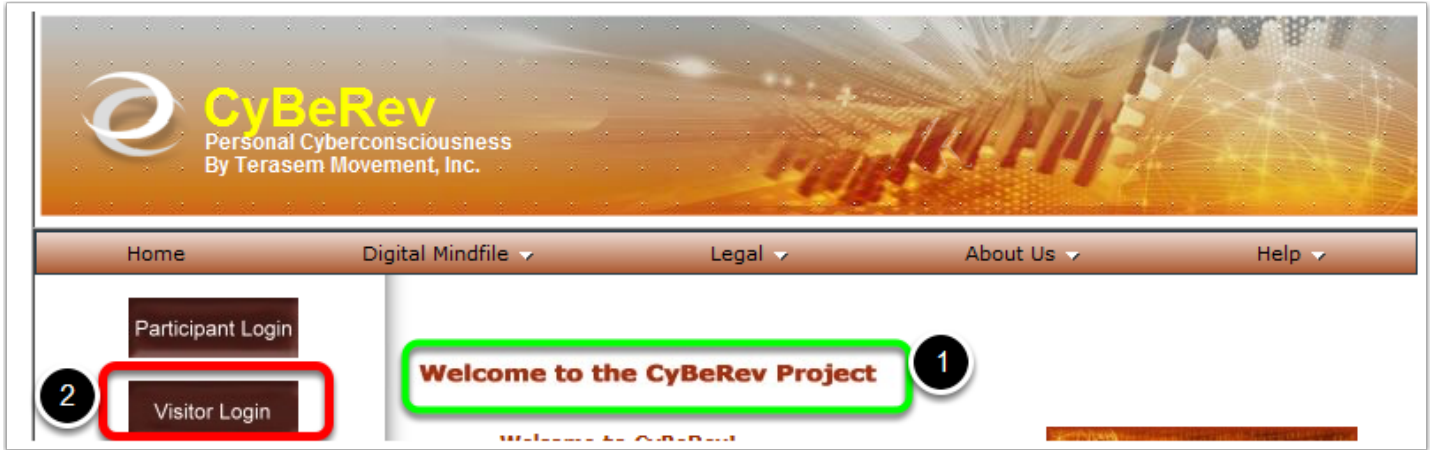
A. Short Procedure to jog your memory when you have accessed cyberev.org already:

1. CyBeRev.org
2. Visitor Login
3. "russ", the Search box
4. In Participants' box click >> box
5. Scroll down to "Recent Text Deposits"
- 6., 7. Click on the Journal article you want within the box.
8. Click "Text"
9. Click "Read"
10. Chose "Open"

B. Detailed Procedure:

1. Starting from any screen where you can enter a web site, key in and enter "cyberev.org".
Expected Result: "[Welcome to the CyBeRev Project](#)" screen: **GREEN**

2. Single-click “Visitor Login” within the shaded box (see above, circled in red).
Expected Result: “Search Participants” screen: RED



3. Under “Screen Name” (circled in **YELLOW**, above) key in “russ” **GREEN** (no other entries required) and single-click “Search”. **RED**
Expected Result: Still on the “**Search Participant**” screen, but now “Russ Cheney” **BLUE** is shown for “Screen Name” within the “Participants” box: **PINK**

4. Within the “Participants” box **PINK**, single-click “>>” (circled in **ORANGE**, to the right, above).
Expected Result: The “**Welcome to Russ Cheney’s Bemes**” screen: **YELLOW** second screen shot below.

5. Page down to “Recent Text Deposits”. **BLUE**

Expected Result: List of available documents:

6. From within the “Recent Text Deposits” box, page down to show the Journal Page (from *To Our Children’s Children*) that you wish to view.

Expected Result: Short list of available documents including your choice. **ORANGE**

7. Single-click the Journal Page that you wish to view. “We taught a horse to drive.doc” is a bonus essay that is not part of the *Children’s Children* book.

Expected Result: The selected document is hi-lited in blue. **GREEN BOX AROUND IT HERE**

8. Single-click the shaded “Text” box. **RED**

Expected Result: The “Text Deposits” page **YELLOW** with your selected document hi-lited in blue.

9. Single-click the “Read” box. **GREEN**

Expected Result: The “Open” and “Save” options are shown on the screen. **RED**

The look here will differ LOTS depending on the operating system and version of WORD!

10. Single-click the “Open” box. **RED**

Expected Result: WORD is invoked and the selected document is shown.

Remember: This is a work-in-progress and no answers are necessarily ever entirely “complete”; some Pages as yet show only the question!


12. To exit, single-click the upper-most “X” in the upper-right corner of the screen. **GREEN** Different, of course, for non-windows machines.

Expected Result: The “**Text Deposits**” screen: Or something you already had on Word!

13. You can select another Journal page to view, or exit. To exit, single-click “Logout” (circled in **PURPLE**, to the left, above).

Expected Result: The “**Welcome to CyBeRev**” screen (same screen as Step #1 above).

14. Key in the next website to which you wish to go.

Journal Entry 01/27/2010:

Perhaps because we always lived at least a two or three hour drive from my grandparents in Lancaster, CA (my father's parents, "Nana and Bapa at the Ranch"), a trip to the Ranch was always considered something very special, and there was always much joy in the planning and upon our arrival, with Dad honking the car horn starting a half mile away from the isolated Ranch property, and my grandparents greeting us enthusiastically from their big covered side and front porch. Nana had invariable prepared an elaborate meal, laid out literally the best china and silverware, and had multiple courses, always insisting that Bapa's superb carving of the prime dish (whether it was beef, lamb, or whatever) was what made the meal so special. Of course, the preparation of such a feast required at least all day, and the delicious smells and fragrances of the repast delightfully saturated the Ranch house.
